City to host National Women's Enterprise Day

LIMERICK is to play host to the annual National Women's Enterprise Day, which will take place in the Strand Hotel next week.

The event, which gets under way on the evening of Thursday, November 18, is designed to recognise and celebrate the contribution women make to the business world.

More than 300 delegates are expected to be at the conference, where they will hear five female entrepreneurs, including

Limerick's Jennifer Ryan, who helped found the Pónaire Coffee Roastery in Annacotty.

She will join Sahar Hashemi, who founded the UK high street chain Cafe Republic, as well as Adarel entrepreneur and hotelier, Mary Fitzgerald.

It is hoped that when delegates hear Jennifer's and other women's stories they will be inspired to set up in business themselves, and help bridge the gender divide.

Although Ireland's city and county enterprise boards have supported

almost 13,500 female entrepreneurs, men are still almost three times more likely than women to set up their own business in this country.

Eamon Ryan, CEO of the Limerick City Enterprise Board, says it is often through knowledge of other business people, that women go into business themselves.

"Research from the Global Entrepreneurship Monitor shows that women who know an entrepreneur are five times more likely to become an entrepreneur

themselves," he explained, "Through profiling the success stories of female entrepreneurs in Ireland on National Women's Enterprise Day, we hope to encourage more women to seek out new business opportunities by setting up their own business."

The National Women's Enterprise Day is co-funded by the European Social Fund with support from the Department of Community, Equality and Gaeltacht Affairs through the Equality for Women Measure.
